FREE SCHOOL MEALS AND ADDITIONAL HELP

This week, the Department for Education announced that they are reinstating the National Free School Meals scheme which is administered by Edenred. Fullbrook will be switching to this system from Monday I February as the vouchers for the next fortnight have already been ordered through our current provider. More detailed information about Edenred will be sent out next week to our Free School Meal families.

NOTIFICATION OF COVID-RELATED ABSENCE

We are required to notify the DfE of covid-related absence from school on a daily basis. In order to do this accurately we would be grateful if parents and staff could send an email to info@fullbrook.surrey.sch.uk to let us know if a student;

- Develops coronavirus symptoms
- Tests positive for COVID-19
- Is required to isolate owing to having been in contact with somebody who has tested positive

Please let us know the date of start of symptoms, the date of COVID test and the start and end dates of the isolation period so that we can log each case correctly.

"I would like to commend two schools for their excellent support to pupils who are homeschooling and their care and continued education of critical workers' children and those with SEN. Well done Fullbrook School and West Byfleet Infant School. My eldest son is homeschooling and my youngest, who is autistic, is in school. Both of their schools have worked flat out under massive pressure and extremely short notice to plan, prepare and roll out online learning and staff rotas and lesson plans for those learning on site. Pastoral care is also being prioritised, with calls being made by Fullbrook tutors to their tutees to check on them and support them. The senco and the head of WB Infant School also called me to discuss and plan for my autistic son's needs during this time. I applaud both of these schools."

This completes the work you gave to them over their Christmas holidays- when do teachers ever rest???! am proud that my daughter goes to this school and really couldn't ask for any more.

These teachers and the Head are clearly some of the most resilient and creative people you could hope to meet, and their commitment to my daughter's education is outstanding."

Thank you again for doing such a good job in such extenuating circumstances, it really is appreciated."





When Max receives a mysterious invite from the untraceable, epic prank-pulling Chaos Club, he has to ask: why him? After all, he's Mr. 2.5 GPA, Mr. No Social Life. He's Just Max. And his favorite heist movies have taught him this situation calls for Rule #4: Be suspicious. But it's also his one shot to leave Just Max in the dust....

Yeah, not so much. Max and four fellow students-who also received invites-are standing on the newly defaced water tower when campus security "catches" them. Definitely a setup. And this time, Max has had enough. It's time for Rule #7: Always get payback. Let the prank war begin.

"This book is pitched as The Breakfast Club meets Ocean's Eleven, and it actually lives up to that comparison. (I know—that's really saying something—but it's true!) Just like in both of those films, there's a crew of characters who are more partners-in-crime than friends, and each one of them is a well-crafted, vivid individual. The book is witty and smart with a pitch perfect tone."

Rod and his cousin take family rivalry to a new level in this rollicking comedy from Jeff Strand. Rod's life is pretty awesome. He plays in a punk rock band that's starting to score gigs and has a great girlfriend. Then he learns that his rich cousin, Blake, will be staying with him for three months—moving into his room, moving in on his girlfriend and band, and basically ruining his life! Prankster Blake has his own ideas on how Rod should live, but his efforts to get Rod girls and bring people to the band's shows are the opposite of helpful. Between Blake's ridiculous pranks and Rod's increasing paranoia, this semester might be the cousins' most memorable yet. That is, if their hijinks don't kill them first.
